WAIHORA via WAIHAHA day walk

Topo50 Map: BG34 Piropiro & BG35 Tihoi

How to get to START:

- Exit Taupo on SH1 North.
- Near top of the hill out of Taupo, left into Poihipi Road
- Follow the road out past the Wairakei Forest then turn left into Whangamata Road, signed for Kinloch
- Do **NOT turn** left at the next sign for Kinloch but go straight ahead till you reach a T-junction
- At the T-junction to SH32 (Western Bay Road) turn left and go for about 10km

 be careful, this is a fast road
- About 2km south of the junction to Waihaha Road cross a bridge over the Waihaha River. Immediately on crossing the bridge turn left into the Waihaha Scenic Reserve Car Park.

From the car park walk back to the main road and cross, taking great care as this is a dangerous very fast road, then walk back over the bridge to access the **Waihaha Track** on the left.

Rough description: A fairly strenuous 6 - 7 hour A to B tramp from SH32 parallel to the Waihaha River to the Waihaha Hut (9.7km) then a hard loop of 14km to the Waihora Road end.

There is next to no climbing involved on the first part– only 250 metres over 10km, the path is very good in most parts and passes many idyllic fishing spots in a very scenic valley. The second part involves about 400m of gain in about 4km so a fair amount of grunting is done on this less well defined track. DOC have (May 2008) cleared back much of the vegetation and there are ample orange track markers. The last few kilometers out are on motorable track but this seems endless when the legs are tired.

Detail: On leaving the Waihaha Scenic Reserve car park (**WP1**472 masl) turn right, northwards, on SH32 over the Waihaha River bridge then immediately turn left on to the track. The track goes NW for about 10 minutes then there is a bend which follows the course of the river and heads WSW and starts ascending. Then there is a V-shaped valley and at about 20 minutes walk time there are some steps down and a track on the left leads to a good trout fishing spot. Cross a swing bridge (**WP2**486 masl) over the Mangatu Stream after about 30 minutes then ascend by some zig- zags.

From here the track is less good and there is a longish ascent with a "look-out" rock on the right (**WP3**559masl) with views of Ruapehu and the valley just walked up; then continue up along a ridge still in the forest basically in a westerly direction.

Waihaha hut



An undulating descent starts just short of the hour and an open, grassy area (**WP4**548masl) is reached in about 1:05 total walking. A slightly muddy section of path is now encountered with views of the river then some rapids and a large "ponded" river section just before another open grassy area, which suggests itself as a campsite (**WP5** *530masl*).

In another 5 minutes the track comes out of bush into beech then mature broadleaf forest. In a total time of 1:45 minutes there is an open area with a minor T-junction with the left branch leading to a view point above the river gorge and where the river goes under-ground (**WP6***556 masl*).

Continuing on the main path in a north westerly direction an "enchanted", mossy forest with Rimu trees is reached in just over 2 hours then the path heads south west and the Waihaha Hut is reached in a bit under 2:30 minutes (**WP7** *589masl*) – or a bit less if the views and vegetation study do not slow down progress.

The Waihaha Hut is in a very pleasant spot and is relatively new with an ample coal supply for heating. There are clear sign posts all around the hut indicating where the various paths go - for Waihora go just west of North. From here on the tramp really changes from almost-tourist type path to real back-country track and bush-bashing - but the track is well indicated with orange markers. From the hut the track heads basically north running parallel with the stream in pretty lush forest with many mature tress and ample birdlife. A stream line is crossed in a deeply incised valley (WP8 607masl) and 20 minutes later the route turns to the right (WP9 629masl) under a large fallen tree – the small track going left is a hunter's track – lying in a small valley, then it is upwards and into rolling terrain. After a fair upwards grunt there is a bit of easier walking as the ridge top is reached (WP10 678ması) but then there are several steep, gnarly-rooted slippery slopes to ascend and descend - care is needed. There is a particularly tricky slope at about 3:30 minutes and there is a river to cross (WP11 560masl) at the bottom of this - wet feet are guaranteed.






Road access from Taupo is the **GREEN** line Waihora exit road the **BLUE** line Tramp route is the **RED** line



The ascent of the day is tackled immediately after the crossing and this is the one where there was once a rope to assist – that rope (**WP12** 577masl) was well past its sell-by date in mid 2008! However, by sidling to the left of the marked trail the ascent is just steep and not really daunting. From here on the feature being looked for is mud – when the mud is hit then the junction for Waihora and Weraroa Trig is not far away. This T-junction is reached after some 6 hours (**WP14** 891masl) and by going right here it is less than one and a half hours to the end of the track.

Roughly 30 minutes from the junction there is a wicked descent followed by quite a hard re-ascent to get across a stream (**WP15** ^{761masl}). After this the track opens up and is wide enough for vehicular traffic and tracks of quad bikes can be spotted. This section of track seems to go on for a very long time but when the slippery red clays are reached take comfort that the car park on the Waihora Road is not too far away. An overgrown branch of the track joins (**WP16** ^{681masl}) the main track at about 7:20 minutes walking and this is a matter of minutes from the end. From the car park (**WP17** ^{673masl}), which can be accessed by virtually any type of vehicle, it is only 10 – 15 minutes of good gravel road back to SH32.
